

Elements of Narrative

The definitions below give you a brief overview of the elements (parts or characteristics) of narrative writing. Remember that narratives may be fiction (made up) or nonfiction (true stories).

Setting—where and when a story takes place.

Atmosphere—the general mood or feeling in a story.

Plot—the series of events in the story.

Conflict

A struggle between two or more characters or between a character and something external (e.g., the weather). The conflict provides the problem in the story that must be solved before the end.

Theme

The main idea that is the author's purpose in writing the story. Theme is often a lesson about life that is taught or shown through the details in the story.

Characters

The people (and sometimes animals) in a story. The main character in a story is called the protagonist and the person who works against the main character is called the antagonist.

Narrator and Point of View

The narrator is the person who "tells" the story (different from the author, who is the person that writes the story). The narrator tells the story from a particular **point of view**.
